# THE VIEW OUTSIDE MY WINDOW

It's time. It's about time because 2011 begins... How auspicious. The beginning of a new *decade*. If you measure time in decades it's remarkable how few of them have passed since Christ – 200 or so. 201! If there were church newsletters written over the last 20 centuries, the phrase I used above would only have been said 200 times. This is only the 6<sup>th</sup> time I've gotten to say that *I will enter a new decade in my life.*

How quickly time moves past when you take time to look at it from different vantage-points. It's popular at the change of the yearly calendar to say pithy things like, "A New Year beckons..." Or "2011 stands before us, inviting us to follow."

Well...not really. A year doesn't *do* anything. It doesn't beckon to anybody and calls out to no one. The date of when a new year starts is a human choice. In fact, a new year starts each and every day, if you measure from one year to the next! Each day, then, is a new year. A year, a day, a week, a month – all the ways we measure time are only meaningful insofar as we *make* them so.

Therefore, rather than saying the year 2011 beckons to you, we *should* say that we beckon to the year ahead as a season of God-given time we are given to be able to make choices

that will honor God and make life a journey of following Christ.

OR, we can sit back and watch what happens as time flows past, which sounds like a waste – a true waste, of time. The point is this: what happens to the year ahead is largely up to each one of us. Choose ahead of time to make the next 1/10 of the next decade count.

Which is another way of saying that we need a vision for our lives and for our common life together as a congregation. The Session has been studying, praying, and working on what our vision for the future is. This kind of work takes time. Up to now, it hasn't been time to talk about that vision. The time has come to study it, discuss it, and live a vision going forward, because it's a vision that helps us choose how to use our time well.

This is especially true because of some big and exciting opportunities that are right in front of us:

**Spiritual Hunger and Openness** – Vancouver and Clark County seem to me to be in a time of openness to the Gospel. As we follow through on "...encouraging you to enter into a life-changing relationship with Jesus..." we will continue to see the need to welcome an ever-new group of wonderful people to our fellowship.

**A Building Project** – CPC hasn't done a major building conversation, upgrade,

or addition in over 26 years. Along with needing to add some obvious things—like an elevator—we have the opportunity to match our campus to our vision of the future.

**New Ministries Locally** – The Lord is always calling us to seek the ‘gaps’ He would have us fill as a congregation. We can’t fill every gap out there – there are many churches the Lord can call on to meet the needs He sees, but there are some we *are* called to. As we continue to see new places of ministry locally emerge, we need a clear sense of vision to guide us going forward.

**Long-term Cross-Cultural Missions Participation** – God has called us to be involved in the mission of the Gospel in other countries in a hands-on way. How will this work out over the next 10 years? Will some from our congregation have a call to full-time mission service? I hope so. Whether or not that happens, we are all called to participate in proclaiming the Gospel in word and deed so that God’s glory in Christ might spread into every land and culture.

Even more opportunities will multiply in the year ahead; in the decade ahead. How will we respond? By waiting and watching others get involved? Or by seeking out the path God wants us to follow by naming and following a vision that guides?

I say it’s time to let our purpose statement be a vision that calls us forward. To

that end, this Winter and Spring we will take an extended look at vision and purpose by hearing God’s Word as it comes to us through the Exodus experience of the people of Israel, and then from the life of Christ in the Gospels.

During Lent, we’ll be asking the whole church to study, pray, and learn together about our vision and purpose. The purpose of this extended ‘hearing’ is to help us move forward with greater unity and purpose as we finalize plans for our campus for the future, as we reach out to more people with the Gospel, and as we grow in our discipleship.

A new decade is in front of us. Christ beckons us to consider carefully and prayerfully how we will invest ourselves in the next 10 years of time that he has created for us to worship in, to live in joyfully, to love in sacrificially. It’s time.

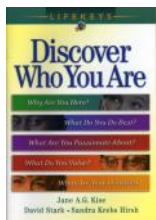

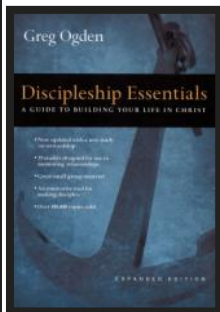

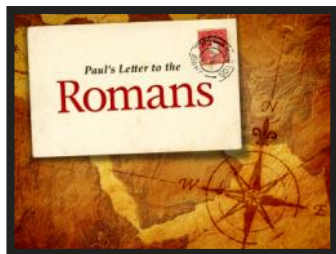
### **"Discipleship Essentials: A Guide to Building Your Life in Christ"**

## COLUMBIA 101



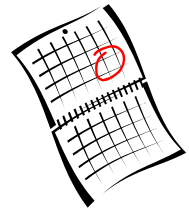

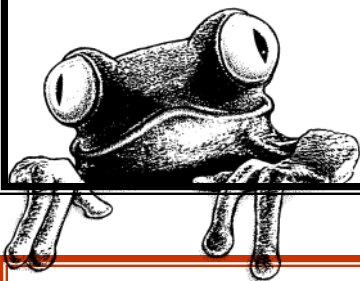

The W.H.O. (Winter Homeless Overflow) shelter desperately needs you to help staff our first week at St. Andrews Lutheran Church. Our first week will start on the evening of Sunday, January 16, 2011, and will end at 9:00 AM the morning of January 23. This is Columbia's seventh year of participating in helping staff the shelter.

This year the shelter opened on Sunday, October 31, and from the start it was apparent that the shelter is still desperately needed. Several times during the first two and a half months it has been at capacity of 51 individuals. There have been as many as 20 children out of the 51 residents. During Thanksgiving week, there were five children under two years of age. This shelter serves homeless women, couples and families. Homeless men who can't stay at Share House stay at the St. Luke's W.H.O. shelter in downtown Vancouver.

This is a perfect opportunity to be involved in a short term mission project to let these homeless individuals see that people care and are willing to provide them with a safe warm place to sleep as well as show them God's love. They really want to be talked to and to be shown some kindness.

This is not just an opportunity for adults, it is also an opportunity for families. If you think that this might be something your family wants to do, please call and talk with Shirley Waltz at 921-3289. When children work there, the children at the shelter have others to interact with. In the unlikely event there aren't kids there, the shelter guests like to see that families come. I personally have already worked 10 Shifts and thus far there have always been at least five children at each one.

We staff the shelter from 6:00 PM until 9:00 AM the following morning. The first shift goes from 6:00 – 9:30 PM. This shift is busy because we greet the guests, serve to them snacks, and help them get towels and materials for showers. We also set up the gym with mats, chairs, and hand out the bedding. The second shift is from 9:00 PM to 1:00 AM. This shift is when the guests begin to settle down to go to bed. Lights are usually out at 9:30. This shift is responsible for washing the towels and wash cloths. They also keep the guests safe and sometimes they need to hand out over-the-counter medications for colds or headaches. The hardest shift to fill is the 1:00 AM to 6:00 AM shift. This shift finishes washing and drying the towels. They make lunches for the guests to take. They also may have to wake up guests who need to get up early (before 6:00 AM). They also restock paper products in the bathrooms. The last shift is the 6:00 AM to 9:00 AM (usually they finish earlier). This group puts out breakfast and helps the guests store their mats, chairs and bedding bags. They also make sure the gyms are swept, bathrooms are shiny and the kitchen is cleaned and the garbage is dumped. Monday thru Friday this morning shift is led by Lorna Cameron and she makes this shift run smoothly.

If a small group wants, they could staff either a whole day or an entire shift. They need to call Shirley Waltz. We will have another week starting Sunday evening, March 13 through the morning of Sunday, March 20, 2011.

## **Clean Water for Haiti**

On November 29, Chris Rolling presented information and discussed "Clean Water for Haiti", another mission supported by Columbia. The well attended gathering heard how the lack of sanitation and clean water continues to devastate the country with chronic disease and health disasters. Clean Water for Haiti (CWFH) has been working for almost 10 years by building biosand filters that eliminate almost all the disease-causing bacteria and require no electricity and have no moving parts or chemicals to work. Chris shared how infrastructure, culture and government in Haiti combine to make it one of the poorest and least healthy countries in the world. ## **WHY GO TO MONGOLIA? ----Because we care!**

Kay Ortman and Nancy Johns completed a short term mission trip to Seoul, Korea and Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia in October. They are members of the Portland/Vancouver Women of Vision Chapter, which is an advocacy/fund raising group for World Vision projects worldwide. The "Children of the Tunnels", has been one of our projects for 12 years to serve street children in Ulaanbaatar. Kay and Nancy have been touched by the terrible plight of the over 3000 street children living in tunnels under the streets, and World Vision has given them the opportunity to help.

"One of my gifts is to be able to see these situations and then communicate the issues here at home in a way that encourages others to get involved in being part of the solutions. This work is at the heart of the World Vision purpose to provide the chance for all children to live life to the fullest," they said. As a chapter, we visit our projects every 2-3 years to encourage the staff in country and provide updated information to donors regarding successes and opportunities.

## **MISSION MINISTRY TEAM-Serving our local community— right down the street**

Plans and volunteers are already in place! So, on January 21, 2011, The Medical Team International Dental Van, sponsored by Columbia Presbyterian, will be at McLaughlin Middle School to provide needed dental care for some of the students. The van will be staffed by volunteer dentists, dental technicians, and a cadre of others. We have and will continue to provide assistance to Marshall Elementary and McLaughlin Middle Schools. This includes lunch buddies, clothing for uniforms, shoes, and other needs identified by the school administrators. ## Fund Raising Guidelines

Session has established some new guidelines for fund raising in the Gathering Area. It is the intent of Session that fundraising in the Gathering Area be kept to a minimum. Accordingly, those ministries currently supported by pledges and offerings will not normally be allowed to raise money in the Gathering Area. Individuals taking short term mission trips will still be expected to write personal letters to members of the congregation asking for prayer and financial support for their mission activities. The church mailing list may not be used as a general mailing list for appeals to support ministry activities of the church unless specifically approved by Session with the exception of the annual stewardship campaign and such things as major capital campaigns. One of the effects of this new policy is that pledges and offering money will be used to partially defray the expenses of both the Senegal mission trip and the Youth mission trips which are part of the normal activities of the congregation.

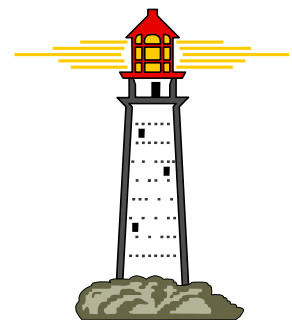
